France and Belgium History Trip

Last week, 51 year 9 students attended a history trip to Belgium and France. On the first day of the trip the group travelled on the Shuttle to Belgium and visited the Passchendaele memorial museum where they were able to experience how the soldiers lived in the bunkers and trenches of WW1. They also got to see the uniform and equipment used by the soldiers - modelled by our very own Luido! Later, they visited different memorial sites of fallen soldiers where they took park in a memorial ceremony and showed respect for those that gave their lives. In the evening they visited the ancient town of Ypres and went to a famous Belgian chocolate shop - and really treated themselves! They also had a lovely meal before going to the Menin Gate memorial ceremony - whey they were incredibly respectful during the two minutes silence - we were very proud of them!

On the second day we drove to France where students went down into Wellington Quarry and explored the underground system that the British dug in secret to try and get behind the German trenches. They visited Vivmy Ridge and time visiting the trenches that have been preserved for over 100 years, before having a final ceremony of remembrance where they laid a wreath and had a moment of silence.

The students had an incredible time, and the teachers in attendance were extremely proud of their behaviour and participation on the trip. Well done year 9!
