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Subject in the spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is English, with the second in charge Mme Ali.

Year 7

Year 7 will begin their 'Introduction to Writing' unit, focusing on developing their creative writing skills. Creative writing involves crafting imaginative fiction and students will explore a variety of activities to create unique settings, characters and stories. By taking on the 'role of the writer,' students will learn to understand the process of making purposeful choices in writing.

Year 8

Year 8 students will dive into the treacherous world of Shakespeare's 'Richard III'. Richard, a master of deception and ambition, stops at nothing to seize the English throne. Students will explore this gripping Shakespearean play, analysing Richard's complex character and the timeless themes of good versus evil, ambition and power. They'll also critically examine Shakespeare's ideas on kingship and gender in the Elizabethan era, uncovering how his insights still resonate today.

Year 9

Year 9 students will step into the thrilling world of detective fiction as they explore Arthur Conan Doyle's iconic Sherlock Holmes stories. They uncover Doyle's fascinating insights into crime, deviance and strict Victorian social expectations. This unit lays a fantastic foundation for their GCSE study of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde next year. Both texts offer an insight into Victorian society, allowing students to examine its rigid class system and the stark divide between the upper and lower classes.

<u>Year 10</u>

Year 10 will explore their second GCSE Literature text: Shakespeare's 'Macbeth' - a thrilling tragedy of ambition, power and violence. They will examine Macbeth's downfall, Lady Macbeth's influence and the witches' role whilst also critically evaluating Jacobean views on gender, hierarchy and deviance. They will uncover how these themes still shape our understanding of power and ambition today.

<u>Year 11</u>

Year 11 will be revisiting and revising their 'Jekyll and Hyde' text, providing an opportunity to recall and embed their knowledge of key characters, themes and key quotations. Students will focus on Stevenson's purpose, particularly the struggles faced by Victorian gentlemen due to strict social expectations, which led to extreme repression of their desires. This revision will help deepen their understanding of the text and prepare them for their GCSE Literature exam.
