Subject in the Spotlight!

This week's subject in the spotlight is.... **Media and Drama** with Head of English and Media, Ms Mackay, and Head of Drama, Ms McGowan.



In Drama this week in KS3 we have been:

KS3 are learning about the theatrical art form of puppetry this half term. They are learning about the different types of puppetry and how it is created around the world. They are watching the National Theatre's production of The Winter's Tale and analysing the effective use of puppetry in this piece of theatre. Next week they will be creating their own puppets and working in groups to bring a puppet (made simply out of paper and masking tape) to life and creating scenes of their own with the puppets.

You can support your child in Drama by asking them if they have been watching the theatre production and getting them to tell you about their impressions of the puppetry used in the play. Your child's Drama education will progress faster if they watch more theatre so please do encourage them to watch the free productions I have provided them with on the Drama Online website. Please note, there are productions suitable for different age ranges so do check the age rating on the video before pupils begin watching.



This week a postcard went home to Abigail for her thoughtful consideration of the use of puppetry in the play we are studying.

In Media this week we have been:

Year 10 BTEC: Continuing their Component 2 Practical coursework project on the design and production of Music Videos! Year 10 have been working on their primary research techniques, ensuring that they are clear on what their target audience are looking for from a contemporary music product. Next week they will be developing their own creative response to the brief, taking into account the information gathered and coming up with a final plan for their music video narrative arc. This will include the development of storyboards ahead of practical filming!

Year 11: Year 11 BTEC: Continuing to refine and improve their Component 1 and 2 coursework submissions, responding to bespoke feedback from their teacher and pushing themselves to meet the Merit and Distinction criteria in each piece of submitted work.



Subject in the Spotlight!

Year 11 GCSE: Have been exploring their Press' case study, learning about the provocative issues of press freedom vs. press intrusion as well as the challenging ongoing debates around the regulation and control of newspapers in the UK. Next week they will be looking in more detail at specific examples of newspapers and the extent to which they allow political bias to impact their presentation of news stories.

You can support your child in Media Studies BTEC by asking to see their coursework and getting them to explain their creative products to you, justifying decisions they have made linked to representation and target audience. In GCSE Media, why not ask your child about the wider research tasks available, the documentaries that you could watch together (see SMHW)- furthering their understanding of the nuances in these challenging and provocative case studies.



This week a postcard of excellence went home to Kimberly in Year 11 who has been consistently engaged in online learning, developing a mature and thoughtful perspective of the nuances of the complex topic of the popular press- even going above and beyond to complete her own research into the unit.







A challenged world is an alert world. Individually, we're all responsible for our own thoughts and actions - all day, every day.

Herstory – 50 Women and Girls Who Shook the World



KS3 – Great Reads for International Women's Day I am Malala

Malala Yousafzai

Winner of the 2014 Nobel Peace Prize When the Taliban took control of the Swat Valley, one girl fought for her right to an education. On Tuesday, 9 October 2012, she almost paid the ultimate price when she was shot in the head at point-blank range. Malala Yousafzai's extraordinary journey has taken her from a remote valley in northern Pakistan to the halls of the United Nations. She has become a global symbol of peaceful protest and is the youngest ever winner of the Nobel Peace Prize. I Am Malala will make you believe in the power of one person's voice to inspire change in the world.

This is the remarkable story of Malala Yousafzai, the schoolgirl who defied the Taliban and went to school. Shot in the head at point-blank range, she was not expected to survive. Instead, Malala's miraculous recovery has taken her on an extraordinary journey from a remote valley in Pakistan to the halls of the United Nations in New York. With a passion and compassion that belies her years, she has humbled politicians and world leaders; she has inspired schoolchildren in the West innocent of the huge privilege that their education confers; and she has been an ambassador for tolerance and equal rights for girls and boys. It is fitting therefore that she has just been awarded the 2014 Nobel Prize for Peace.

The history-making, ground-breaking speeches of Greta Thunberg, the young activist who has become the voice of a generation

'Everything needs to change. And it has to start today'

In August 2018 a fifteen-year-old Swedish girl, Greta Thunberg, decided not to go to school one day. Her actions ended up sparking a global movement for action against the climate crisis, inspiring millions of pupils to go on strike for our planet, forcing governments to listen, and earning her a Nobel Peace Prize nomination.


