Good afternoon everyone!



We hold Remembrance to reflect on the horrors of war

and so to avoid repeating the mistakes of the past. We also hold Remembrance to reinforce British values such as courage, duty and self-sacrifice.

I want Remembrance to be an opportunity in which we all question the reasons for conflict and for students to consider their own role in shaping future peace. I am always thrilled to see many of you in history and PSHE lessons researching and thinking about the impact of war on families, local communities and entire nations. I am also aware that we have some in our school community who have been affected by war first-hand and so I want us to be a community who are empathetic in our understanding of the physical, emotional and social costs of war. I want us to be a community that understands and encourages healing and Remembrance helps us to do this.




KS3 Soldier Dog, Sam Angus

Covid-19 testing in school

Dear Parents and Carers,

As you may know, the NHS is currently rolling out a series of tests that can be carried out easily and quickly to identify positive cases of Covid-19, even when no symptoms are showing. Over the next few months these tests are likely to become used frequently across our lives; when we travel, go to large events, where we work and where we study.

I am therefore writing to let you know that The Hurlingham Academy has been chosen to be one of the first schools in the country to participate in this mass testing programme.

The test we are being asked to use is one that is already being used in some other schools and across the City of Liverpool where it is being offered to all residents. Students and staff at another United Learning school, Sedgehill Academy, are already successfully taking part in the programme and I have been in close contact with them about how it is working.

The test is non-invasive and is already proven to be perfectly safe. It will say within minutes if your son or daughter is carrying the virus that causes Covid-19, even if they are not showing any symptoms.

We expect the first round of testing to take place next week and it will be carried out by trained medical professionals. Taking part is entirely voluntary both for students and staff. Please click on the link to complete the consent form - Here.

We are very pleased to have been invited to participate in this important work which could ultimately improve all of our lives by allowing Covid-19 cases to be more quickly identified and, in that way, play a vital role in how we combat Covid-19.
