This week I was heartened by a great step forward in the world of equality and inclusion. Chancellor Philip Hammond made the announcement in his Spring Statement that the government will fund free sanitary products for girls in secondary education. For me, this is a welcome response to the concerns shared by myself and many head teachers following research by Plan International that one in 10 girls between the ages of 14 and 21 in the UK have been unable to afford sanitary products, while 49% have missed an entire day of school because of their

period. The campaign for free sanitary products was started by a 17 year old, Amika George, which goes to show that our young people have the power to make a change. We talk a lot at The Hurlingham Academy about 'using your voice'. Speaking loudly and proudly in lessons; sharing ideas and giving feedback to our staff and voting in the Youth Parliament Elections. This is an excellent example of how a strong, passionate voice can result in monumental change.

Last Wednesday, Marvin, Lorenzo and Seif in Year 9 took part in the UnitedApp final at IBM's headquarters in central London. 
Top of the leaderboard for Hegarty Maths this week are:
