Geography Field Trip

On Monday 20th January, Year 10 Geography students embarked on a 3-day residential trip to the Field Studies Council - Flatford Mill near to the Essex/Suffolk border. Their aim was to investigate how coastal management at Walton on the Naze impacts the community. Students carried out a series of methods to investigate this, such as measuring the beach profile and analysing sediment at two sites on the coast – one with coastal defences and one without. They then discussed their findings and analysed their results back at the centre, concluding that the coastal defences impact the community positively because they prevent coastal erosion meaning attractions such as the Naze Tower do not fall into the sea. Although cold, the weather

was glorious, and the sun shone throughout the trip. Students worked very hard and

were a credit to the school. They are now well-equipped with the knowledge and understanding needed for 15% of the

GCSE geography exam. Well done Year 10 geographers!
