

Mr Wilson's Weekly Message



Welcome back after what I hope was a restful and enjoyable half term. Over the half term I have been reflecting on the importance of maximising every minute of learning time in every lesson. I treated myself to a little maths calculation, and as a trained maths teacher I do hope that my maths is correct. I calculated that if just 3 minutes of lesson time is wasted each lesson, that would accumulate to 21 minutes per day, 1 hour 45 minutes per week and an

astonishing 68 hours per school year. This is if just 3 minutes of lesson time wasted. Imagine the impact if a pupil misses a day of learning due to absence or poor behaviour. To ensure that this does not happen here at The Hurlingham Academy, we believe that consistency and clarity of routines is key. During assembly on Monday morning, I reminded pupils of the expectations of our school, and the importance of being in every lesson, every day. I have been absolutely thrilled to see our routines so well embedded as I walk around the school this week, meaning teachers can get on with doing what they do best, teaching the highest quality lessons to our pupils. Year 7 Trip to Oxford

On Monday, 33 students in Year 7 visited The University of Oxford to as part of the Brilliant

Club Scholars' Programme that they took part in last term, for which they all wrote a 1500 word essay on different subjects. As part of the trip, students were given a tour of St Edmund's Hall and Wadham colleges, met with university students to ask questions, and had a graduation ceremony celebrating their success in the Scholars' Programme.







Safety Update: Covid-19

While it is no longer a legal requirement to self-isolate with a positive case of COVID-19, it is still advised that people stay home and self-isolate for a minimum of five days. The guidance advises self-isolation until showing two negative test results on consecutive days. Therefore, this will be our recommendation as a school. Subject in the Spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is History, with Head of Department, Ms Mowbray

This week in: History....

It has been a big week for KS3 historians as many of them moved into their new tutor groups and met their new teachers!

Year 7: Y7 have continuing with our unit on the role of the Church during the Middle Ages and the methods it used to control people... This week we found out about what people thought caused disease in the Middle Ages, including punishment from God, an imbalance of the four humours (bodily fluids), movement of the planets or miasma (nasty smells)!

Year 8: Y8 have been considering which was the most important factor in the outbreak of the English Civil War in 1642. They argued whether they think religious, political or economic reasons were the main reason for the start of the war and evaluated the significance of Long-term, Short-term and triager causes.

Year 9: Y9 have been learning about the League of Nations and how it was set up to maintain peace and avoid the outbreak of another world war in 1920. Over the next few lessons students will consider why the League of Nations failed and whether there was any way it could have been avoided.

Year 10: This week Y10 students moved on to the final section of their 'Health and the People' GCSE unit - which will look at the developments in medicine from 1900 until the present day. In the final part of the course, we will look at the impact of the world wars, government reforms and the creation of the NHS, alongside the impact of the AIDs and Covid outbreaks on medicine today.

Year 11: Are coming to the end of their final GCSE unit 'Conflict and Tension 1918-1939 - the inter-war years' and considering how far Neville Chamberlain's policy of appeasement should be blamed for the outbreak of WW2. Next week Y11 will move on to revision ahead of their upcoming mock exams.

Year 7 Netball


