Subject in the Spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is.... Science with the head of KS4 Science, Ms Deng. This week in: science......

Year 7: Year 7 are learning about the Human Reproductive System. Students will learn about the process of fertilisation, gestation as well as the process of birth. Furthermore, students will gain a better understanding of how their bodies will develop in this module.

Year 8: Year 8 students are learning about Electricity. Students are learning about how energy is transferred through the movement of charges in wires and how resistance affects the flow of current. Students will move on to learn about electromagnets very soon.

Year 9: Year 9 students are learning more about the human organ systems. Our year 9 students have learnt about the respiratory system, digestive system and reproductive system previously, and they are currently learning about the musculoskeletal system. They are developing an understanding on how the muscles, bones, and joints work together to allow movement. They will then continue their learning on respiration.

Year 10: Year 10 have started learning about Electricity. In this unit, students will learn about the differences between current, charge and voltage. There are many opportunities in this unit for students to complete practicals investigating electricity. Students will also familiarise themselves with how electricity is transmitted in the UK.

Year 11: Students have started learning about Inheritance, Natural Selection and Evolution. In this unit, students learn about genetic disorders like polydactyly and cystic fibrosis, and how they are inherited. From this, they can use Punnett Squares to predict the probability of a couple having children with certain traits. Students then go on to learn about how all living organisms have evolved via natural selection and the causes of extinction.


