Subject in the spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is Drama, with the head of drama Ms Mayall.

Coming to the end of the Autumn term, all students in KS3 are gearing up for their Drama assessment which will be during lesson time in the final two weeks of term. Every KS3 student will be assessed on a performance of a scripted piece, with the final marks going towards their rank order along with other subject assessments in January.

Year 7: At the beginning of their Drama learning journey, Year 7 have been focusing on mastering naturalistic performance skills each week in the style of the theatrical practitioner Konstantin Stanislavski. They have been exploring the performance of a different poem each week in tandem with a new performance skill. Year 7 have been exploring war poetry from their English lessons to make the most of their understanding of these new texts, including 'Sick Leave' by Siegfried Sassoon and 'Anthem for a Doomed Youth' by Wilfried Owen. These texts offer the students the opportunity to consider contexts of war and the mental health issues that arise as a result of conflict. Currently, Year 7 are learning their lines and rehearsing in Drama lessons each week to achieve a successful final performance for their assessment!

Year 8: As Year 8 are developing in their Drama learning journey, they are exploring their first play text to perform for their scripted unit assessment. They have been considering different scenes from 'The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time' each week in tandem with recapping the performance skills they were introduced to in Year 7. This text, paired with the study of the theatrical group Frantic Assembly, offers students the opportunity to consider wider themes of neurodivergence, familial relationships and non-naturalistic physical Drama. Year 8 are also currently learning their lines and rehearsing their final performances of scenes from 'Curious Incident' to achieve a successful final assessment performance!

Year 9: Coming to the end of their KS3 Drama journey and preparing for potentially taking Drama through to KS4, Year 9 are exploring their second play text in KS3 to perform for their scripted unit assessment. They have been considering different scenes from the stage adaption of Malorie Blackman's 'Noughts and Crosses' each week in tandem with recapping the performance skills introduced in Year 7 and recapped in Year 8. By exploring 'Noughts and Crosses' alongside the theatrical practitioner Bertolt Brecht, Year 9 have been able to consider wider themes of racism, prejudice and representation through non-naturalistic Dramatic performance. Year 9 have also been rehearsing each week during lesson time and learning their lines at home to ensure a successful final assessed performance in KS3!
