## Subject in the Spotlight-MATHS

**Year 7:** Year 7 are learning about the mean. This is a topic which extends the work they've done on averages in primary school, building in more problem solving and application, as well as applying some of the algebra skills they learnt last term. This is their first look at statistics, which they will be building on every year until their GCSEs, as well as something they will be applying in other subjects, such as science and geography.



**Year 8:** Year 8 are learning parts of geometry (the maths of shapes and measures). Some classes are learning about angles in parallel lines, and others are moving on to learning about the circumference of circles. This is the first time students will have been introduced to the mathematical constant pi, and a great opportunity for them to tackle challenging problem solving and real -world applied problems.

**Year 9:** Year 9 are learning about probability this term. This is a topic which permeates so much of modern science and technology, from the statistics behind scientific experiments, to analysing chance in computer games, to the large language models behind recent advances in artificial intelligence. This first unit in probability gets built on in year 10, then becomes a major component of A-level maths for students who choose to go on to study A-level.

**Year 10:** Year 10 are also learning about probability, building on from their first unit last year in year 9. Topics range from appreciating the importance of large sample sizes, to calculating conditional probabilities, often using advanced algebraic techniques for higher-tier classes.

**Year 11:** It's the home-straight for year 11 now, with just over 100 days until the first maths GCSE exam. Most classes have now finished learning the content for the course, and are following be-spoke revision programmes based on their performance in different topics in their November mocks as well as regular checking from their teachers. For example, one class is reviewing circumference and perimeters of parts of circles, another class is tackling difficult problem solving with vectors, and another is recapping all things angles.
