

Mr Wilson's Weekly Message





Pupils need to ensure they are prepared. Some useful revision strategies include creating a mind-map of key topics; learning key vocabulary and memorising information and then self-quizzing to check your own understanding. It is vitally important that the pupils perform to the best of

their ability in all their assessments, as the results will be used to inform predictions and set changes. Pupils have revision materials from their teachers, and they should use these to ensure they feel confident and prepared for every assessment. The manifests, revision materials and additional material are available on the school website and Show My Homework. I encourage all pupils to make best use of all your resources and I would like to remind you all about the importance of checking their exam timetable and revision manifests, and of course getting a good night's sleep each night. I would also like to thank all parents and carers for your support throughout the mock period. All pupils need to come back on Monday, ready to demonstrate their knowledge and skills in their assessments for the rest of the week.

Year 7 Green Futures Trip

On Wednesday all our Year 7 students travelled to Kensington Gardens to participate in a day of conservation activities facilitated by Royal Parks.

The theme of the day was 'the power of plants', and the activities were aimed at increasing the biodiversity of the park and increasing its resilience to climate change and other related threats.

Students learned traditional skills such as coppicing, a sustainable way of cutting branches off trees to be used for fences and to create woodland wildlife habitats. A popular activity was 'sucker pulling', here students learned how trees in distress send up new branches and growths with an aim to ensure their survival. The students learned that the best way to ensure the survival of these trees in distress was in fact to pull up and remove these 'suckers', directing energy and nutrients back into the main tree itself - a task they set about doing with great enthusiasm!





Always the favourite activity in a similar vein is 'bramble bashing and deadhedging'. Students used sheers and loppers to cut back bramble so that more nutrients went to the surrounding trees. They created great environments for insects and invertebrates with the dead matter which will boost local biodiversity further.

But it wasn't all destruction! Students dug a hole for and planted our own tree in the park, and groups planted thou-

sands of bluebell and snowdrop bulbs for growing next spring. They prepared the ground for a new meadow by harrowing in teams of 16, and overseeding the area with yellow rattle seeds.

It was a fantastic day, the first of three conservation days that Year 7 will be participating in this year. Bring on the next one in the Spring!
