Have a lovely break over the October half term.



Subject in the spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is.... History with Ms Mowbray

Year 7: This week Y7 have been coming to the end of our first unit of the year on 'Medieval worldviews' we have been considering the question of how connected the world was in the year 1000, through looking at Medieval Constantinople, Baghdad and the story of St Foy in Europe. After half term students will begin learning about the events which led up to the Norman conquest in 1066.

Year 8: Y8 have been concluding their unit on the reasons for Henry VIII's Break from Rome and evaluating how each of the causes interlink to help them to justify what was the most important factor. After half term students will move on to look at the impact of the Break from Rome and the 'religious rollercoaster' which followed, throughout the reigns of the remaining Tudor monarchs.

Year 9: Y9 have been learning about the MAIN causes of the First World War (militarism, alliances, imperialism and nationalism) by exploring how the combination of long-term, short-term and trigger causes led to war and whether it was inevitable all along. After half term we will be learning about the experience of 'the Great War', looking at the role of propaganda in recruitment, conscientious objectors, trench warfare, Empire soldiers and the women's suffrage movement.

Year 10: Y10 have been learning about the Early Modern section of their study of medicine through time. We learnt about how this period moved away from the Middle Ages as a period of continuity when medicine and Public Health were heavily controlled by the Church, to the begining of a period of change. After half term we will continue to explore the cultural and social changes during the Renaissance and the impact of the decline of the power of the Church.

Year 11: Y11 have completed their unit on the USA 1920-73 this week. Students have explored a whole range of social and political changes this half term including the rise of popular culture n the 1950s, the impact of McCarthyism, the Civil Rights Movement and the Women's liberation movement. Next half term we will be moving onto our unit on Elizabeth I, where we will explore the challenges and successes of her 45 year reign!
