Hurlingham and the Bomb Factory Art Foundation Collaboration





We have been very lucky to have been granted funding for a year long programme in collaboration with the Bomb Factory Art Foundation thanks to our grant request being accepted by Earls Court Council.

The Bomb Factory Art Foundation stand for: fostering inclusivity and accessibility in the art world by dismantling barriers to art education and enrichment.

The studio offers a free residency programme for artists who may not have access to studio spaces, allowing them to develop a body of work that culminates in an exhibition in one of their 5 galleries. Through this, along with their internship programme, they ensure that all individuals and communities have equal opportunities in the art world.

The year-long programme allows our students to gain skills from a wide range of artists who work in different creative disciplines.

Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge 2023

Each young person deserves to have their voice heard by as many people as possible. It was wonderful to see Year 10s doing exactly that. On Wednesday, they spent the day participating in expert-led workshops for the Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge 2023.





Throughout the workshops, students engaged in a series of interactive activities, from impromptu speeches to group discussions, under the guidance of our external facilitators from the Speakers Trust. Students not only learned the art of captivating an audience but also discovered the power of their own words. The Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge empowers our Year 10 students to become articulate and influential communicators, a skill that will undoubtedly serve them well in their academic journey and beyond.







Subject in the Spotlight– Geography with Mr Charkham



Year 7: After a short introduction to geography at KS3, Year 7 have been studying how rivers change as they flow from a tiny trickle near their source, far inland, into the vast, land-shaping flows that empty into the world's oceans. It's a broad unit of work, packed with new key words and many new processes to remember - they've started fantastically well!

Year 8: Year 8 have been studying population and migration, which first looks to understand how populations around the world differ according to a country's level of development and location. We start by asking whether we should panic about global overpopulation, and then start investigating this question! After a look at the major factors that influence the distribution of world populations, we consider the experience of refugees, and work to understand the push and pull factors driving various patterns of migration both abroad and here in the UK.

Year 9: Year 9 are studying what is probably my favourite unit of work, 'Emerging Economies'. This asks why the BRICS nations (Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa) are they growing so rapidly in income, and what this means for their citizens and the rest of the world. Interestingly each nation has a very individual story of economic growth, but many of the patterns and important themes within, such as migration, urbanisation, and different types of employment, are the same, many of which have direct impacts on us in the UK today.

Year 10: This week year 10 students are into the second topic of their GCSE course, which is 'Development Dynamics'. They have spent the first half of term up to this point studying unit 1, global hazards, including tropical storms, earthquakes and volcanoes. The year 10 residential trip is coming up later this month, and we are taking over 70 students (the most ever!) to Essex for three days to study coastal management, contributing to their fieldwork which is worth 15% of their GCSE.

Year 11: Year 11 are coming to the end of their final GCSE unit, 'Human Landscapes of the UK', in preparation for November's Mock exam. They will soon be heading out into the local area to study environmental quality at three different sites, to see how they compare. They will be carrying out questionnaires with the local community (you have been warned!) and studying the land use also. It's go go go for our year 11s, we are hoping they are rewarded for their hard work so far with some strong Mock results this month!




This week in the Library!
