

#### **British Science Week at THA**

Last week, the Science corridors of The Hurlingham Academy was abuzz with excitement as we celebrated British Science Week. This year's theme focused on exploring Alsupported solutions to climate change, and students had the opportunity to dive into a variety of hands-on activities that combined creativity, innovation, and scientific inquiry.

The week kicked off with students creating posters inspired by designs generated by artificial intelligence showcasing some ideas of how AI can support addressing climate change issues. On Tuesday, students explored how to generate electricity using everyday household items. The competition was fierce, but the standout performance came from Ollie Whiting, who crafted a circuit using lemons and potatoes that produced an impressive potential difference of 183V. Ollie's inventive approach showcased how simple materials can produce significant energy.

The highlight of the week for many was Wednesday's Lego Robodog Race House Competition. Students were challenged to memorize a colour pattern, and when presented correctly, their Robodogs advanced forward. The competition was both thrilling and tense, with Veritas emerging as the victorious house.

Thursday saw the return of the much-anticipated Science Quiz, which was very well attended. Students tested their scientific knowledge across various disciplines, reinforcing key concepts while enjoying some friendly rivalry.


