Exploring the River Tillingbourne with Y10 GCSE Geographers

Last Friday, 55 enthusiastic GCSE geography students embarked on a fieldwork expedition to the River Tillingbourne in Surrey, eager to put their classroom learning into practice. The trip was a fantastic opportunity to explore how a river's characteristics change as it flows downstream, and our students rose to the challenge with curiosity and teamwork. Armed with tape measures, meter rulers, corks, and timers, the students conducted a series of investigations at multiple sites along the river. Their aim was to measure three key variables: width, depth, and velocity. These data points would help them understand how the river's profile changes as it flows downstream. The students worked in small groups, carefully recording measurements and observing the surrounding environment, taking into account ideas around flood risk and why precautions had been taken by councils to protect important roads from flooding. They discovered that the river widened and deepened as it progressed, with noticeable increases in velocity at downstream locations. The use of corks to track water speed was a particular highlight simple yet effective, and a great way to bring theory to life. Beyond the data collection, the trip offered a chance to appreciate the natural beauty of the Surrey countryside. The weather was stunning, and the riverbanks provided a peaceful setting for learning and reflection. Teachers were impressed by the students' engagement and precision throughout the day.

This fieldwork experience not only reinforced key geographical concepts but also devel-

oped practical skills and confidence. It was a memorable day of learning outside the classroom, and we look forward to seeing how students use their findings in mocks and GCSEs beyond.

A big thank you to all staff who helped organise the trip, and to our students for making it such a success. Here's to more adventures in the great outdoors!
