



Mr Wilson's Weekly Message



Subject in the spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is... Geography with the head of department, Mr Charkham.

Year 7: Year 7s have had a fantastic start to the year, they started off by learning key geographical skills such as finding locations using co-ordinates and how some parts of the work are mis-represented by different map projections. This has been followed by the rivers and flooding course, which includes many new concepts and key words – they've worked so hard to master these new terms and it's been brilliant to teach them as they get to know the school and community.

Year 8: Year 8 have been studying population and migration, which starts by asking if we should be panicking about overpopulation! We look at how population, or 'demographic' trends change as a country develops, move on to look at patterns of migration and how they affect 'source' countries (where migrants have left), and 'host countries (where migrants have moved to), both positively and negatively.

Year 9: Year 9 have been studying a personal favourite of mine, the 'Emerging Economies' course, which looks at how some of the world's fastest growing countries, such as China, India, and Brazil, have been changing both socially and economically since the 1980s. It's a chance to understand vast trends such as urbanisation and look at how people live and work in the world's new megacities.

Year 10: The year 10s started the year with a trip to the River Tillingbourne in Surrey to carry out fieldwork for their Paper 2 GCSE next year. It was a fantastic day and they carried out the investigation thoroughly and in a way that will serve them well as they tackle fieldwork questions in the exam in 2026. Since then, we have been studying global hazards like climate change and tropical storms, and will soon move into tectonic issues, such as earthquakes and volcanoes.



Year 11: Y11s have almost finished their Paper 1 course in preparation for November's Mock exam. They've been working hard, and this week Mr Baker's class have been out in the community for their fieldwork looking at how quality of life in Parsons Green. It's been a good start to the year, but we need to keep up the great work!
