



Mr Wilson's Weekly Message

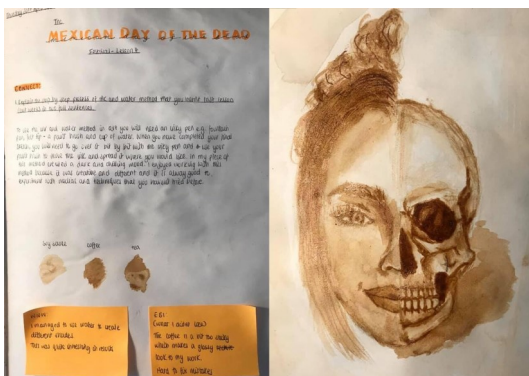


Last week United Learning held a Town Hall meeting (by telephone) for all staff across the trust. The meeting was hosted by Chief Executive, Jon Coles. During the meeting, Mr Coles outlined the steps the trust is taking to ensure all schools across the group have what we need to carry on providing education from home. He also spoke to the big question on everyone's minds... "When will schools reopen?". Mr Coles reiterated the government message that a decision will be made based on the latest daily data. Although we do not know when this will be, we have been told that when a decision is made, all

schools will be given 3 weeks notice to prepare and ensure our schools are fully ready with all necessary safety precautions in place. I will communicate with you as soon as I am told. Rest assured that the health and safety of our staff and students will be at the forefront of how we reopen. Today and every day until then, all of the staff here at The Hurlingham Academy are focused on delivering high-quality education resources that pupils can access from home. With your encouragement, students must commit time each day to completing the work set. We will not have time to catch up in the autumn, and it is unlikely there will be adjustments to the curriculum, so it is imperative students keep up. We know it is not easy to work from home, as I have found out myself. Please do remember that we are always here to support. If you have any concerns, please do not hesitate to get in touch with the school. This weekend is a bank holiday weekend, so I encourage you to take some time away from the computer screen to relax and appreciate the family and friends you have around you.

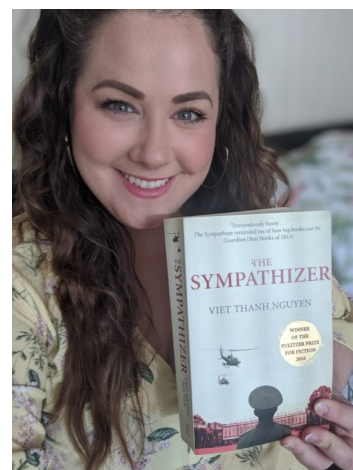

I have been reading **The Sympathizer** by **Viet Thanh Nguyen**, which is set in Vietnam and the USA, at the end of the Vietnam War in the 1970s.

The book follows a soldier who openly fought on the losing side of the war, whilst actually being a spy for the other side... It follows his experiences as the war ended and his divided loyalties as he escapes and starts a new life in the USA. It gives you an insight into what it may have felt like to be on both sides of the conflict. It is a satirical (darkly funny) book and keeps you on the edge of your seat, but ultimately is a story of love and friendship in challenging times. I love books that help me to put myself in other people's shoes, and this story opened my mind and took me to another time, to another part of the world, to get a taste of a very different life to my own.
