Wilson Cup

It feels like a lifetime since we were able to take our pupils for a sports fixture. On Thursday afternoon, we kicked-off the Wilson Cup – a tournament between ourselves and Lambeth (no prizes for guessing who named the tournament!!). The competition commenced with Y10 boys' basketball. We took an 8-man squad consisting of Elijah O, Joaquim Justin T, Liam, Daniel P, Alfie V, Florian, and Najae T. After a decent warm up of lay ups, shooting, and 1 vs. 1, we tipped of at 4:25pm. Lambeth came flying out of the blocks going 4-0 up in the early stages of the match. The first half largely consisted of the team getting to know each other on a full-sized court, and matching the Lambeth energy, who were quick on the offense and organised in defence. We came in at halftime 13-2 down. After a few points to improve from Mr Pudney, and a quick team discussion regarding tactics, we started the second half like a new team. Elijah was making the most of his 6 foot 5 inches frame and pounding towards the Lambeth basket, making a number of baskets in quick succession. This really took Lambeth by surprise, who also were not able to attack as fluidly as they had done before. We were quicker to intercept the ball, and supported each other a lot more with rebounds and transitioning from defence into attack. A basket each for Joaquim and Liam, as well as more from Elijah got us back to 23-22. Elijah drove toward the basket and was giving a shooting foul which meant he had two shots. With 15 seconds left on the clock, Elijah requested a time-out to hydrate and re-focus before his free-throws. After a quick team

talk, we were ready for the final moments of the game. Elijah narrowly missed his first free-throw, but sunk his second. 23-23! We dropped quickly into defence as Lambeth tried to quickly attack and steal the win. Out of nowhere, we were able to quickly intercept and attack down the right centre of the court. Daniel and Joaquim sprinted forwards and attempted a lay up which hit the rim and backboard, Joaquim collected the rebound and attempted a shot which also narrowly missed, and virtually straight after that passage of the play the buzzer sounded to finished the match. 23-23. Subject in the spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is.... Modern Foreign Languages with Ms Cabo.

This week in MFL...

Year 7 have been learning about physical descriptions and pets. They have learnt more adjectives to describe their and someone else's appearance, reinforcing the 3rd person description in the target language. Students have reinforced the use of key verbs in the present tense, such as 'he/she is' and 'he/she has'. They will continue working on this next week to consolidate the first unit of the year.

Year 8 have been learning about the activities they would like to do and justifying it. They have recently been introduced to the past tense in order to express what they did yesterday and their opinion about it. They will continue reinforcing this topic next week to consolidate the unit for 'free time' before the end of the term.

Year 9 are working on the topic of relationships. They are learning how to express their future plans and what they want to do in the future. In order to do this, students are reinforcing the use of key grammar (near future tense) as well as recapping previous vocabulary linked to family members.

Year 10 have been learning about the topic of holidays. Students have worked on key vocabulary about how to book accommodation whilst on holiday and they have also learnt how to express any problem they may have with their room or facilities. Students have also practised how to make requests in the reception of a hotel.

Year 11 have been learning about role models. Students looked at different famous people who have had a big impact in the world and they have discussed the qualities of a good role model and how the media and celebrities impact young people's behaviour. Students are now moving to exam-style questions as a revision of the topic of 'free time' in preparation of the next mock exam and the speaking exam.
