Subject in the Spotlight!

This week's subject in the spotlight is.... Geography with Senior Vice Principal and Acting Head of Geography, Ms Quinton



This week in Geography we have been :

Year 7: Learning how rivers change as they flow from source to mouth, shaping the land as they go. It's a great introduction to important processes that will recur across topics in the geography course, such as erosion, transportation and deposition. This week we have been revising the causes and impacts of the 2010 floods in Cumbria, a key case study, ahead of the assessment!

Year 8: Understanding how a country's level of development and income drastically determines the level of damage that it suffers from tectonic hazards, such as earthquakes. Students have been investigating how buildings are designed, and the public trained in Japan, to minimise damage when disaster strikes.

Year 9: Exploring the world's different biomes, from the tropical rainforest and the savannah, to the northern-most tundra, as we started the GCSE course this term. Year 9 have looked at the challenges of protecting these vibrant and sensitive ecosystems from human activities and exploitation, whilst balancing the need for economic growth, in what remain some of the world's poorest regions.

Year 10: Preparing for GCSE Paper two by exploring our city, London! We've recently finished the 'human landscape' unit, which studied London's journey over the last 80 years through deindustrialisation and decline, to rebranding and regeneration in recent years. It has been interesting to discuss the impact of coronavirus on so many of the ways in which we live and work.
