This week's subject in the spotlight is.... **Modern Foreign Languages** with Ms Cabo, Head of MFL.



In MFL this week we have been:

Year 7: In Spanish, we have been learning about free time activities and students have been able to describe what they like doing in their free time and why. They have also learnt how to talk about other people's activities. Next week we will be consolidating the unit and we will review the content learnt this half-term. In Mandarin students have learnt how to talk about the school routine and express their opinions about different subjects they like and next week they will learn about the differences between Chinese and English schools.

Year 8: Both Spanish and French students have been learning about healthy living, typical food in France and Spain and the things they must and must not do in order to stay healthy. We have also focused on how to talk about feelings and ailments. Next week we will be reviewing the unit to consolidate our understanding on this topic. In Mandarin, students have learnt vocabulary about shopping and how to ask prices, reinforcing key and useful vocabulary and next week, they will learn how to compare online shopping and traditional shopping.

Year 9: Exploring the differences between festivals in French/Spanish speaking countries and the UK. We have learnt about typical food and we have looked at interesting festivals and discuss what people do. Next week we will be reviewing the topic and consolidating our knowledge of key festivals around the world.

Year 10: Students have been learning about the topic of my city. They have practised how to order in w shop and they have discussed the good and bad things of the place where they live. Next week we will be reviewing different tenses and consolidating the unit.

Year 11: This half term we have been reviewing the units of school, relationships and holidays and next week we will be consolidating the topic of holidays, talking about where we have been to in the past and future plans and wishes.

The 2021 Census

In History this week, students are learning about the Census.

What is the census?

The census is a survey that happens every 10 years and gives us a picture of all the people and households in England and Wales. The next census takes place this Sunday 21 March 2021.

Your answers to the census questions will help organisations make decisions on planning and funding public services in your area, including transport, education and healthcare.



The last census

The last census took place in 2011. Many people and organisations used information from the 2011 Census in a variety of ways. For example, Bristol City Council used it to inform decisions on how to fund local housing improvements. It was also essential for the charity Redbridge Council for Voluntary Services to help people from ethnic minority groups learn more about dementia.

Why is it important?

Historians use information from sources like the Census to find out about how our country and communities change over time.

We are going to have our own Hurlingham Census to help us find out about our school community. Each student will complete their census information independently and confidentially to get a flavour of what the Census is all about and why we do it. We look forward to the results and what we can learn from them!
