Students have learnt the importance and consequences of mental health and hopefully have learnt some ideas to help counteract it.

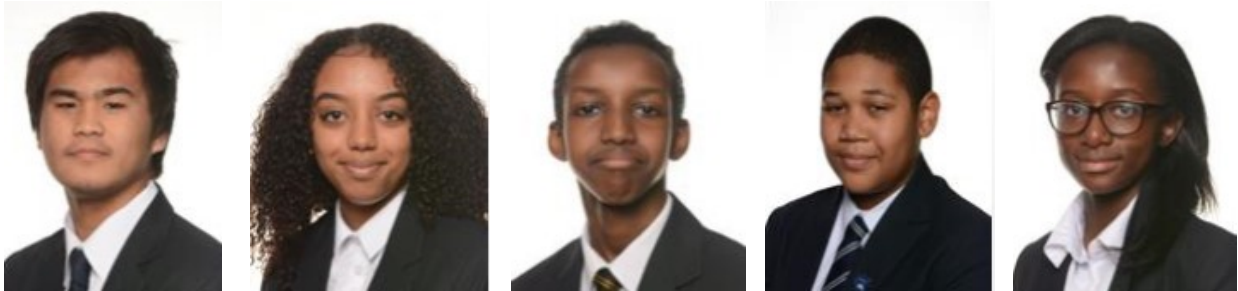
The House competition on Wednesday was a Mental Health quiz which was designed and run by Tania from 8H. Tania has also written the following write up: *"The quiz was designed to get people thinking about different health issues such as depression and anxiety, and to make people aware of what they look like. I think that the students that participated learnt something new and had fun by working together and being resilient. There were three rounds of the competition, a multiple choice round, a picture rounds and a quotes round. The multiple choice round was fairly easy, as you just had to say the answers and it was designed to get you thinking. However, the picture round was a bit challenging as you had to think carefully and imagine what that specific mental health issue or subject looked like, for example depression or empathy. The final round was possibly the hardest because you had to fill in the gaps with the missing words from key motivating quotes, two of which are from the walls around school. For example, a quote by Serena Williams was 'A champion is \_\_\_ defined by their wins, but how they \_\_\_ when they fail'. Hard eh? The missing words are 'not', and 'recover'. There was not one winner, but the Houses that came first were Caritas, Aequitas and Veritas with 9 points and Unitas second with 8 points. The quiz was out of 14 points. I enjoyed the quiz because it gave me the confidence that I never knew I had by speaking in front of a large number of people. I also felt a sense of leadership by being able to run a House event."*



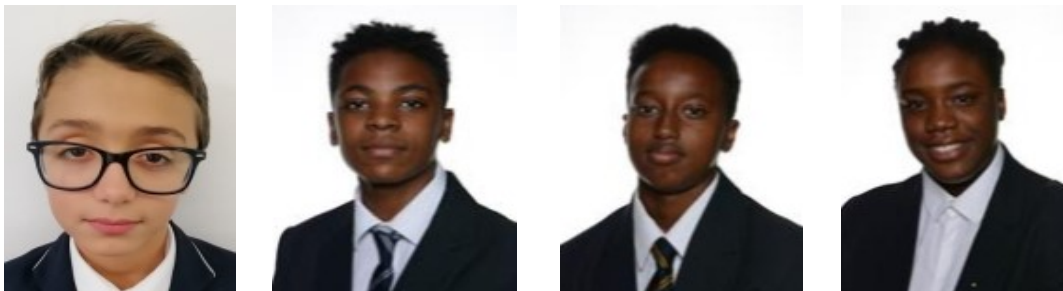
## Mr Wilson's Commendations
