## Subjects in the spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is.... English with Head of English, Ms Mackay.

This week in: English

**Year 7:** Year 7 units have started the year with an exploration of poetry! The students are learning all about the most interesting poetic methods, and considering the power of individual word choice. The poems they are exploring at this stage include famous WW1 poets such as Wilfred Owen and Vera Brittain. We are proud of seeing the Year 7s develop their empathy for these late poet's experiences, and taking the opportunity to construct poetic pieces of their own!

**Year 8:** Year 8 are studying Charlotte Bronte's Jane Eyre. This is a classic Victorian novel with exciting gothic themes. Dark, twisting and turning - it tells the story of a young girl growing up in a challenging and unpredictable world. The students are having discussions on important topics such as gender roles and social expectations, and trying to decipher Bronte's clever messages to the reader.

**Year 9:** Year 9 are enjoying their first Shakespeare play of the year: Romeo and Juliet! They are reading, watching and performing from the classic tragic love story - immersing themselves in a world of passion and conflict! Alongside this, students are reading love poetry from a range of diverse contemporary voices and asking the question: is the experience of love timeless?

**Year 10:** Year 10 have started their GCSE study in English with Stevenson's The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde. This intense and challenging text presents several complex and ambiguous protagonists and a mystery that is not revealed until the very final moments. Alongside this, students are working on their creative writing skills - developing their ability to craft well-structured and expressive narratives.

**Year 11:** Year 11 begin the year with their final Literature text: the Power and Conflict poetry cluster. This collection of 15 poems is a vast and varied presentation of internal and external conflicts from a diverse range of writers. Students will be coming up with interesting comparisons between these perspectives and asking themselves what their own views are on the same big questions!


