



# Subject In The Spotlight



This week's subject in the spotlight is.... Science with Ms Wong.

This week in Science...

**Year 7** have been learning about particles and separation methods. They are completing practical work on filtration, evaporation, and distillation. Soon they will learn about paper chromatography and solubility.

**Year 8** have been learning about the periodic table, the atomic structure and formation of ions. They will be able to understand and use the periodic table effectively by the end of this module.

Year 9 have completed the module on biological system. They have learnt how the muscles and bones work together and, the effect of exercise on breathing and respiration. They are now starting their chemistry module. Soon, they will learn about chemical reactions between acids and alkalis.

**Year 10** have been learning about the heart and how it pumps blood around the body. Students have also been learning about heart diseases and risk factors for non-communicable diseases. These topics have allowed them to identify lifestyle factors that are linked to various diseases in the UK such as Type 2 diabetes and coronary heart disease. Soon students will look at structure and bonding in Chemistry.

**Year 11** have been learning about the nervous system and hormones in the menstrual cycle. Students looked at how the body can self-regulate through homeostasis and negative feedback to regulate conditions such as blood sugar levels. Students are now moving on to the unit Forces and Motion where they will learn about the effects of forces in everyday life and the work of Isaac Newton.
